MACHINERY NEWS.

The first shed meeting for 2004 at Bob's home kicked off with a short sharp storm just before 6pm. We had a good turn-up despite the storms racing through the area. I hope the storm of last Friday [30jan.] did not damage your homes.

Comparing notes, some of us lost power for up to 24hrs. Foodstuffs don't like being warm for that long. Looks like stews for the next week or two.

Some of the Club members might ask what we do on the Wednesday evenings. We have settled into a program which most of us enjoy.

Group led problem solving and news sharing.

Show and Tell.

Project work on Triton and other machinery.

Great fellowship. [tea & coffee and munchies available.]

Bob and Ian are the ideas men, and come up with interesting projects. The projects include using Triton machines such as saw bench, planner and router, and using general machinery such as bandsaw, linisher, scroll saw, thicknesser and what- ever members bring along to assist with projects.

Show and Tell.

Shaun brought along more military figures in various parade ground poses. He is getting up platoon strength, I reckon.

Bob showed his new concept in timber drums, with compound dovetailed sides. The careful use of a thicknesser made finishing off the job easier.

Antarsia [? spelling]. Was passed around, and sanding and shaping various timber inserts showed how things can be brought to life with our colourful Aussie Timbers.

Problem Solving.

Peter has large planks [about 2400+240+100], of semi-hardwood timber, which are part of an outdoor top table and seat setting. Everyone suggested a way of removing the old polyurethane finish, and coming up with an oiled finish to restore the unit to better than original condition.

Optimising set-up and accuracy on bandsaws.

Project Work.

We made up cotton reel-holders, which are useful for quilters. These involved using saw bench, router, scroll saw and linisher.

We started bandsaw training with the aim to making 3 piece trivets.

Bob came up with his solution to marking out designs for the bandsaw and scrolls. He photocopies the design to scale to suit the timber. Uses a spray adhesive on the timber surface only. Presses the photocopy onto the glued surface, and proceeds to make the saw cuts.

Removal is generally easy, as the paper pulls of the instant glue. If the glue is a bit sticky, then a pass with a hair dryer will soften the glue allowing removal of the paper. A light sand, and the work are ready to finish off.

That's it for me; hope to see you all at the Club activities throughout the year. Cheers, Len.

A REPLICA STEAM ENGINE.

CLUB PROJECT.

On Wednesday, we placed the drawings of the various parts of the steam engine on the notice board. Our hope is that we will be able to use the parts made by various members of the Club to produce a steam engine replica or something that resembles a replica. The accompanying notice invites interested members to select a part they might like to make, take a photo copy of it [the drawings are to scale templates] sign their name in the spot provided, [so that we can keep track of who is doing what – we don't want 20 sets of front wheels], and then go home or down to the Club shed and start making it. Included is the list of the suggested wood, but because it is an American plan most of the wood mentioned is not available to us so it is really only useful as a guide. We can make decisions about what we think might be suitable, from what is available, as we go. It might even be a good idea to use scrap timber initially before making the final part from a better quality timber.

Thanks to the efforts of a couple of members we have already created a small supply of wood, from which you can choose and if you are not sure what to use let's talk about it. It may be a good idea, if you are making a part that connects closely to a part somebody else is making, to do a bit of informal fitting to confirm that they fit together. Please do not apply any finish at this stage but do sand to finish. We can make a final decision about the finish to apply when the model has been completed.

Please remember that this project is designed to be enjoyable so let's do the best we can but keep it in perspective. We are not trying to become steam engine engineers. You will also notice that there are some colour photos of the model which features on the front cover of one of the American Woodturning magazines in the library.

It is not intended that we duplicate that model precisely, but it may help us to realise where and how we may be able to include copper and brass, for highlighting purposes. Remember, if you have any questions, please feel free to ask.

BANDAID BITS.

BEFORE THE HOSPITAL.

If you injure yourself seriously, here's what to do before that urgent dash to the hospital. Over the next several newsletters I will cover the basic, practical things to minimise a life-threatening event or prevent further injury.

You've done something dumb or something has gone wrong in the workshop. Now the first question is "am I ready to meet my maker?" If the answer is "no" then get help fast! If the injury is not so bad then the question usually is "should I go to the hospital with this?" If you need to ask then you probably need to go. There are a few basic rules and the application of common sense, which will make you more comfortable and help ensure the best outcome.

Over the next few months we will tackle each of the basic injuries one at a time, however, first, the easy stuff!

Life Threat ening Injuries.

This means anything that could kill you, such as poisoning, electrocution, chest pain, difficulty in breathing, arterial bleeding [blood isn't just running out, it's squirting out – in time with your pulse] or your wife/husband!

Decide if the injury is life or limb threatening. If it is, call "000", keep quiet and wait for rescue. Lie down – it's less painful than a fall! Apply a pad of what ever is handy and apply direct pressure, elevate the limb if possible. Be advised to leave the tourniquet for the war movies, otherwise you might lose a limb.

Assuming your injury isn't life threatening but is more that you can fix with duct tape, super glue or sawdust, DON'T PANIC! It is often said that the first thing to do in medicine is to take your own pulse and there is no truth to it. Next month we look at injures to delicate body parts, like something in your eye! Bye for now.
